CATCH Prep's strategy for using federal funds is to increase low income and English learner student performance to the proficiency level. CATCH Prep has focused Title One monies with a focus on literacy as a preventative measure. CATCH Prep data reveals that the gap between Latino students and their African-American counterparts begins with literacy. CATCH Prep uses federal funds to provide supplemental funding to increase college readiness opportunities and resources to low income families and students of color (Latino and African-American subgroups). The CATCH Prep English learner program has been very successful in closing the performance gap. CATCH Prep plans to continue the current plan of having strong newcomer supports along with targeted supports to support intervention opportunities over the course of a high school career.

Alignment

CATCH Prep supplements literacy intervention programs by offering after school interventions and supplemental Math and English teacher support to Title One students. CATCH uses Title One funds to provide after school tutoring for low income students, and additional during-the-day interventions for low income students who demonstrate skill gaps in Math and English Language Arts.

Title One funds have also been used to have low income students take the SAT during the school day and to offer a study class that takes place on Saturdays. Increased services for English Learners include primary language aides in the mainstream classroom to assist students access core content areas. And English learner coordinator also helps to coach mainstream teachers on English learner strategies and provide coteaching in classes with larger English Learner populations.

CATCH prep promotes parent, family, and community engagement in the education of Title One Students:

CATCH employs a bilingual family engagement specialist to do outreach to parents of English Learners and Title I students. Also, parent liaisons exist at the site to support parents in finding community resources, holding parent workshops and gathering information about community needs.

Translation services exist at all CATCH events, and paper mailings and home visits are coordinated by district parent liaisons. Additionally, when requested, Parent Liaisons accompany parents to teacher conferences, site meetings, and assist with applications, forms and understanding parent notifications regarding report cards, assessments, and other school related materials.

CATCH Prep focuses Title One monies on our single high school site. This site has the highest percentage of students on the Free and Reduced lunch program because it is currently our only school site within the LEA.

CATCH Prep provides social-emotional support services and tutoring to McKinney-Vento students. A licensed social worker is assigned to work with all families from the registration process, and assists with placement and services such as translation, transportation and tutoring.

To facilitate the transition from elementary school to middle school, and from middle school to high school, CATCH Prep teachers across educational level collaborate on curriculum planning to ensure continuity of approach and alignment of content, with the goal of a continuous experience for students. To help students and families familiarize themselves with all schooling options, in the spring, 5th grade students are invited to spend part of a day in our high school setting, as well as 8th grade students who are invited to spend several days visiting the CATCH Prep campus. Additionally, families are invited to school welcome nights, and 6th and 9th grade students receive a home visit from their new counselor. At the home visit the advisor shares information about the school, answers questions from the student and family, and begins the process of building a relationship with that student and family.

To facilitate the transition for students with IEPs, CATCH Prep education specialists meet with matriculating schools to share information about the needs of students who are transitioning and the best ways to support these students. These teacher meetings are in addition to the IEP transition meetings with families that are required by law. These transition meetings are held over the summer, or within the first month of the school year.

To facilitate the transition from high school to post secondary education CATCH Prep provides an internship experience, concurrent college enrollment opportunities, and support with the college matriculation process the summer of senior year. CATCH provides an opportunity for each student to engage in an academic internships at businesses, government agencies, and nonprofits. Companies hosting CATCH Prep interns have included: The Foundation For The Junior Blind, Los Angeles Urban League, Art & Practice, and many more.

In addition, CATCH provides all students with access to a personally curated digital library of ebooks that can be accessed on smartphones, tablets, and laptops from the service Overdrive.

CATCH provides a wide range of professional group and improvement opportunities for teachers and school leaders, including:

Induction: CATCH teachers who need to clear their California Credential participate in the CATCH Induction program, a two-year experience in which each teacher selects a focus area (based on an Individual Learning Plan) and works with an Induction team and coach to improve their practice in this Area using an improvement science approach. CATCH funds the Induction coast and mentor fee for its teachers.

Mentors: New to CATCH teachers receive one-on-one mentorship from a veteran colleague at their school site. The mentor regularly meets with the new teacher, and conducts classroom observation.

New Teacher Odyssey: New to CATCH teachers participate in a 6-day on-boarding, professional

development experience focused on project based learning and instructional design.

Equity & Innovation Days: CATCH teachers participate in 3-full day organization-wide professional development sessions focused on improving teaching practice in one of the following areas: mathematics instruction, literacy, project-based learning, NGSS integration, and collaborative & restorative practices, using an improvement science approach.

School-Based Professional Development: CATCH teachers meet multiples times per week with their school-based colleagues in different configurations including: staff meetings, academic discipline meetings, collegial coaching sessions, project tunings, and lesson study groups.

External Professional Development: CATCH provides funding for teachers and school leaders to participate in external professional development opportunities, including PD offered by: The National Equity Project, Teaching Tolerance, The Art of Coaching, and Crucial Conversations.

Teachers On Special Assignment at CATCH use various data platforms to determine which classes need additional support in literacy and math. The allocation of support is then used in conjunction with a Response to Intervention plan develop by the CATCH Counseling Office to provide comprehensive and coordinated support.

CATCH Prep continues to develop continuous improvement capacity among staff members and build the data infrastructure to support this work. Through a partnership with USC, CATCH Prep staff members participate in college access, math, and literacy networked improvement communities. Each of these communities met for at least three full days during the current 18/19 school year.

Participants used a continuous improvement methodology to get better at supporting college access and improving numeracy and literacy instruction. For the 19/20 school year, CATCH plans to increase the number of teachers participating in the math and literacy improvement communities

In addition, new CATCH teachers participating in the Induction program received training and coaching in a continuous improvement methodology. To date, 14 teachers have participated in the induction program. With the support of a School Improvement Coach, teachers have worked in groups on topics such as supporting early literacy, co-teaching, and ensuring quality group-work.

A key element of Continuous Improvement work is the consistent use of learning cycles. CATCH Prep engages in learning cycles to determine whether a particular LCAP action or service is leading to the targeted improvement in student outcomes. To support the use of learning cycles, CATCH has built an internal data dashboard with measures aligned to the LCAP that is updated in real-time. This data dashboard provides school leaders and teachers the necessary data to conclude whether a particular change is leading to the desired improvements in student outcomes. Furthermore, each measure can be disaggregated to ensure that improvements are being realized for each subgroup.
